More than 500 members contribute funds and volunteer hours throughout the year to support league programs. It's not all work, though. You make new friends, acquire new skills, find new mentors and receive leadership train-



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ing.

The Arlington group is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

League President Stephanie Todd said that since the organization's inception in 1975, it has donated more than \$2.5 million and 1 million volun-

teer hours to more than 100 groups in the area.

This year, the league will donate \$163,000 to projects its members support, including The Rainbow Room, AIDS Outreach Center, SafeHaven of Tarrant County, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Arlington, Friends of the Arlington Public Library, JLA Center for Community Service, Leadership Arlington, Rebuilding Together and Meals on Wheels.

The league will hold an open house at 6:30 p.m. May 24 at its Center for Community Service, 4002 W. Pioneer Parkway, for women 21 and older who are interested in becom-

ing members. You do not have to be an Arlington resident.
